The Council in pursuance of its powers under the above mentioned Act and Order hereby **GRANTS PERMISSION** for the carrying out of the proposed development as described above and in accordance with the application and plans registered by the Council on 23 August 2017 subject to the following condition(s):

1. The development shall begin no later than five years from the date of this decision.

Reason:

To comply with the requirements of Section 91 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

2. The development shall be carried out in accordance with the following approved plans and documents:

6154-01 Rev C 'Retaining Wall Scheme Plans & Elevations', 6154-02 Rev C 'Retaining Wall Scheme Sections & Construction Details' and 'Retaining Wall Calculations Revision B' received on 20 December 2017

Reason:

For the avoidance of doubt as to the approved development and to accord with Circular 016:2014 on The Use of Planning Conditions for Development Management.

3. Prior to their use in the development hereby approved, details (including a sample) of the facing stone to be used in the construction of the development hereby approved shall be submitted to and approved in

writing by the Local Planning Authority. The development shall be completed in accordance with the approved details within 6 months of the approval of these details.

Reason:

To safeguard local visual amenities, as required by Policies SP1 (Delivering the Strategy), SP10 (Built and Natural Environment), Policy MD2 (Design of New Development) and MD8 (Historic Environment) of the Local Development Plan.

Reason for Granting Planning Permission

The decision to recommend planning permission has been taken in accordance with Section 38 of The Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004, which requires that, in determining a planning application the determination must be in accordance with the Development Plan unless material considerations indicate otherwise. The Development Plan comprises the Vale of Glamorgan Adopted Local Development Plan 2011-2026.

It is considered that the decision complies with the Council's well-being objectives and the sustainable development principle in accordance with the requirements of the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015

Having regard to Policies SP1 – Delivering the Strategy; SP10 – Built and Natural Environment; MD2 - Design of New Development; MD5 – Development within Settlement Boundaries; MD8 - Historic Environment and Supplementary Planning Guidance 'Amenity Standards' and Dinas Powys Conservation Appraisal and Management Plan, it is considered that the proposed works to the front garden are acceptable by reason of their scale, design and materials and does not have an unacceptable impact on the character of the dwelling, street scene, Dinas Powys Conservation area and on the amenities of any neighbouring properties

NOTE:

The applicant should submit two separate certificates under the Technical Approval Procedure, to the Visible Services Division (contacts below), one for the Design Procedure and another for the Checking Procedure. The design requires an independent check by another engineer who may be from the Design Team. Both certificates need to be countersigned by a Principal of the organisation responsible for the design and the check. Please note that this consent is specific to the plans and particulars approved as part of the application. Any departure from the approved plans will constitute unauthorised development and may be liable to enforcement action. You (or any subsequent developer) should advise the Council of any actual or proposed variations from the approved plans immediately so that you can be advised how to best resolve the matter.

In addition, any conditions that the Council has imposed on this consent will be listed above and should be read carefully. It is your (or any subsequent developers) responsibility to ensure that the terms of all conditions are met in full at the appropriate time (as outlined in the specific condition).

The commencement of development without firstly meeting in full the terms of any conditions that require the submission of details prior to the commencement of development will constitute unauthorised development. This will necessitate the submission of a further application to retain the unauthorised development and may render you liable to formal enforcement action.

NOTES

Notification to be sent to an applicant when a Local Planning Authority refuse planning permission or grant it subject to conditions.

Appeals to the Welsh Government:

- If you are aggrieved by the decision of the Local Planning Authority to refuse permission for the proposed development or to grant it subject to conditions, then you can appeal to the Welsh Government under Section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended).
- If you want to appeal, then you must do so within six months of the date of this notice, using a form which you can get from The Planning Inspectorate, Crown Buildings, Cathays Park, Cardiff CF10 3NQ or you can access their website here: <https://gov.wales/planning-appeals>
- The Welsh Government can allow a longer period of an appeal, but will not normally be prepared to use this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal.
- The Welsh Government need not consider an appeal if it seems that the Local Planning Authority could not have granted planning permission for the proposed development or could not have granted it without the conditions they imposed, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of any Development Order and to any directions given under a Development Order.
- In practice, the Welsh Government does not refuse to consider appeals solely because the Local Planning Authority based their decision on a direction given by them.

Purchase Notices:

- If either the Local Planning Authority or the Welsh Government refuses permission to develop land or grants it subject to conditions, the owner may claim that he/she can neither put the land to a reasonable beneficial use in its existing state nor render the land capable of a reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted.
- In these circumstances, the owner may serve a Purchase Notice on the Council. This notice will require the Council to purchase his/her interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of Part VI of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended).
